County kicks off 2016 budget process

Presentations by county departments and agencies on their business plans and financial resource requests for budget year 2016 got underway Monday. The presentations will be heard by the budget review team made up of five Gwinnett residents who have volunteered to help Commission Chairman Charlotte Nash set priorities and make recommendations for the 2016 budget.

New to the committee this year are residents Lisa Burleson and Santiago Marquez, while review team veterans Mark Brock, Burt Manning and Latabia Woodward are returning. Burleson is a retired district level administrator from GGPS and Marquez is CFO/VP of the Georgia Hispanic Chamber of Commerce. Brock is building

maintenace director for GGPS, Manning is a retired real estate appraiser and assessment administrator, and Woodward works as a strategic planning principal for Georgia Power.

The chairman's 2016 budget proposal will be available to the public Nov. 17 prior to a public hearing Dec. 7. By county ordinance, the Board of Commissioners must adopt the annual budget during its first meeting in January.

CID releases video to explain goals

The Gwinnett Place Community Improvement District has released the ACTIVE Gwinnett Place master plan, which charts a path for redevelopment of Gwinnett's central business district.

Building upon the 2012 Livable Centers Initiative study, ACTIVE Gwinnett Place identifies catalyst projects for investment to improve transportation, connectivity and livability. With input from area property owners, local business interests, civic leaders, Gwinnett officials and GPCID board members, the master plan identifies an infrastructure framework that invites mixed-used developments, creates greater connectivity between commercial centers and enhances public green space.

The plan's key elements include a "grand promenade" trail network, an iconic bike and pedestrian bridge connecting with McDaniel Farm Park, intersection and roadway improvements, and storm water management solutions that can also serve as a public amenity.
