The world's largest swimming lesson could take place in Gwinnett County.

On Tuesday, June 14, thousands of kids and adults at aquatics facilities around the world will unite to seek a new global record for the World's Largest Swimming Lesson (WLSL). Bethesda Park Aquatic Center has been selected as an Official Host Location for this 2011 WLSL record-setting event, to take place from 11 a.m. to noon.



The inaugural WLSL event established the Guinness World Record for the largest simultaneous swimming lesson ever conducted in 2010 when almost 4,000 participants across 34 states, five countries and three continents participated to build awareness about the vital importance of teaching children to swim to

prevent drowning.

Tragically, drowning is the second leading cause of unintended, injury related death of children ages 1-14 in the United States. In fact, more than one in four fatal drowning victims are children 14 and younger. And, research shows if a child doesn't learn to swim before the third grade, they likely never will. The WLSL program works to promote drowning prevention through education by focusing the energy of thousands of participants on a clear and specific message all at the same time.
